Multiply that by however many people have heard the good news of this Messiah, and you start to get an idea of how world-shattering Jesus was. Now fast forward to 2024, where tales of this Jesus continue to circulate but the kingdom of which He speaks exists only in the periphery of true believers. The vast majority of human-kind rolls on oblivious to His reign. The Good Lord must be exhausted.

Upon their return from their first foray into the world of ministry, the disciples are understandably weary. Jesus invites them to come away with Him to the wilderness to rest and replenish.
